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Healthy Zones in Ealing

This academic year, the Healthy Zones programme worked with eight Ealing schools, delivering workshops, training and support for the whole school community. Parent coffee mornings focused on budget-friendly packed lunch ideas and fussy eating have been a highlight, receiving excellent attendance and fantastic feedback. Parent-child cooking sessions have also proven hugely popular, showcasing simple and nutritious recipes that families can enjoy making together.

Staff and student engagement has been key to the programme's success, with highlights including sensory food education for the whole school and Vietnamese summer rolls with over 200 Year 7 students. Tailored staff training has also helped create healthier school food environments.

As schools begin drafting their own food policies with our support, the upcoming term will focus on consolidating these achievements into sustainable policies, ensuring a healthier future for students. Although the programme ends in April, participating schools can continue their activities, and schools that didn't participate can access these resources through the **Health**Improvement Team's new

Sustainability in action

Reflecting on my 10 weeks working as a Sustainability Manager in Schools (SMS), it's amazing to see how much has been accomplished in such a short time. At Our Lady of the Visitation Primary, I began by building connections, launching the Eco Group, and conducting surveys with staff, pupils, and the wider school community to understand their sustainability priorities.

The Eco Group conducted a detailed sustainability audit across eleven key topics, identifying areas for action.

Change through sustainability The students then brainstormed and pitched three exciting projects to an Eco-Dragon's Den panel: The Plastic Revolution, Save The Watts, and The Nature Ninja's Wildlife Reserve.

Alongside the School Business and Canteen Managers, we measured the school's carbon footprint and identified ways to reduce emissions. Already, we've cut food waste by 3kg per week, recycled 20kg of e-waste, secured 25 trees for planting, started composting, and adopted green catering policies—all while advancing the school's Climate Action Plan well ahead of the DfE's 2025 deadline.

Seeing students grow in confidence and leadership through the SMS programme has been inspiring, highlighting their teamwork and creativity.



Did you know that nearly one in three five-year-olds in England had tooth decay in 2022? This alarming statistic highlights the significant impact poor oral health can have on children's lives, including their school attendance.

Tooth decay remains the leading cause of hospital visits for children aged 6 to 10. In 2022, it accounted for two-thirds of hospital admissions for under-19s, costing the NHS a staggering £81 million for extractions alone. Children from disadvantaged areas face even greater challenges, being three times more likely to require a tooth extraction than their peers.

Locally, Ealing is among the most affected areas, with the 4th highest rate of tooth decay in five-year-olds in London (National Dental Epidemiology Programme, 2022).

To tackle this issue, Ealing has introduced a range of initiatives including the Supervised Toothbrushing Programme in schools and nurseries, as well as training and workshops for staff, families, and children. Led by our oral health promoter, Adele Francois, these efforts also extend to community outreach events.

The Big Green Ideas Competition aimed to inspire and support schools to develop innovative solutions to reduce their carbon footprint.

Entries closed on 15 January, with eight schools submitting creative videos showcasing their ideas for a greener future. We were deeply inspired by the ingenuity and passion demonstrated in each video, reflecting the students' commitment to the environment.

The competition will judged by a five-person panel, on 21 January including Jennifer Peters (Assistant Director of Planning, Design and Sustainability), Mark Tomlinson (Head of Climate and Sustainability), and Councillor Driscoll.

The winning school will be announced at the Green School Network on 21 January and will receive £1,000 to fund their sustainability initiatives. This school will present at our Summer Celebration Event, showcasing how the funds have helped them further their green goals.

Healthy masculinity

With voicebox



Voicebox has been working with schools in London and beyond to empower young people to promote and embody healthy masculinity, tackle "toxic masculinity" (or what they call "unhealthy masculinity"), challenge misogyny, prioritise students' mental, physical and social wellbeing and promote gender equality.

Through their assemblies, workshops, and programmes, Voicebox has worked with over 22,000 young people and partnered with 110 schools.

Their Healthy Masculinity workshops - designed for KS3, KS4, and KS5 - engage both boys and girls in meaningful conversations around masculinity, gender equality, and misogyny. These sessions equip students with the skills to challenge harmful behaviours and attitudes in their daily lives.

For younger students, Voicebox offers a workshop on 'Rethinking Strength and Being an Ally' which fosters early conversations on gender and allyship.

Voicebox also offers teacher training, equipping educators and professionals with tools to challenge unhealthy masculinity and drive positive change.

Outreach Events

During 2024, the Ealing Public Health team hosted 11 outreach events across the borough, at two community sites and nine primary schools. Dental staff saw nearly 800 children for free dental checks and applied fluoride varnish where applicable.

Many different staff were involved, including the public health team, dentists and dental therapists, oral health promoter, school readiness lead, ALFIE Programme, the Health Improvement team, immunisation nurse, asthma specialist nurse, Family Information Service, children's services, Job Centre Plus, Learn Ealing, community champions, and more.

The events aimed to promote oral health and connect families with dental staff, as well as raise awareness about various children's services available in Ealing.

As well as performing dental checks the dental staff were able to signpost families to local dental practices. Children identified as needing further treatment received a letter and were advised to visit a local dentist. These families will be followed up where possible to ensure they received the care they needed.

These events were a great opportunity to engage with families about the range of services available in Ealing. 800

For example, mums looking to get back into work received advice on workshops and training, families learned about benefits they were entitled to, and there were great conversations about services like asthma and immunisations.

We plan to hold more outreach events in 2025, using available data and lessons from this year to choose our event locations and improve our future work.



Revamping our anti-bullying policy At Featherstone Primary School

As part of this years Caring week, our School Council undertook a thorough review of our Anti-Bullying policy, demonstrating their dedication to creating a safe and inclusive environment for all students. The process began before Caring Week with an initial meeting between the School Council leaders and the School Council Lead, where they reflected on the existing policy.

During Caring Week, the School Council consulted their classmates, gathering feedback on the policy's effectiveness and suggestions for improvement. This consultation gave students the opportunity to voice their opinions and contribute to refining our Anti-Bullying strategy.

In their final meeting, the School Council shared their findings with the Council Lead, representing their peers. Together, they revised the policy, incorporating key changes such as introducing the term "upstander," training Featherstone Friends to become Anti-Bullying Ambassadors, and including explicit references to the Equality Act (2010) and Protected Characteristics. Additionally, the policy's title was changed to reflect both Anti-Bullying and Friendship, underscoring the importance of being a good friend as a means of preventing bullying.

Ealing is home to one of the UK's few mental health crisis cafes for children and young people: The Circle. This dedicated space is designed for 5-18 year olds experiencing mental distress, providing a warm, welcoming, and safe environment for those at or near crisis point.

Rather than waiting in long queues at A&E or receiving non-specialised support, young people can visit The Circle for advice, support, or simply for someone to talk to. Services are available through drop-ins or appointments, and the facility offers clinical support in a relaxed, calming atmosphere when it's needed most.

The Circle is located at 46 South Ealing Road, conveniently situated on the 65 bus route, just a 2-minute walk from South Ealing tube and a 15-minute walk from Ealing Broadway station.

The government's plan to classify misogyny as extremism highlights the urgency of the issue. The Online Safety Bill mandates stricter protections, including age verification and prompt removal of harmful content.

Education plays a vital role in combating these issues by helping young people develop critical thinking and digital literacy skills. With the rise of scams, fake news, and online manipulation, equipping young people with the ability to spot red flags is essential.




